Feature Article

April 30th, Opening Day of Trout Season in California

From the CDFW: The traditional trout season opener the last Saturday in April remains one of California's most celebrated and anticipated outdoor traditions, drawing thousands of anglers to trout fishing destinations such as Burney and Dunsmuir in the north, Bridgeport and Bishop in the eastern Sierra, Mammoth Lakes in the south, and many other mountain communities and picturesque hamlets throughout the state. This year, California's traditional trout season opens on Saturday, April 30, one hour before sunrise throughout many counties in the state.

In recent years, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) has expanded trout fishing opportunities year-round in many waters, yet the traditional trout opener remains popular. April 30 will mark the start of the catch-and-keep season on many streams and creeks, as well as the reopening of much of the eastern Sierra to trout fishing for the first time since last fall.

Most lakes, rivers and streams have a limit of five trout per day and a 10 trout possession limit. Regulations differ on season opening and closing dates, bag limits, minimum and maximum size limits and gear restrictions. Anglers are strongly advised to check specific area regulations and opening dates in the 2022 California Freshwater Sport Fishing Regulations available [online](#).... CDFW's "Hoot Owl" Water Watchlist [web page](#) offers some voluntary guidelines for freshwater fishing during a drought year and may list specific waters where fishing should be avoided midday and other recommendations.

For anglers interested in learning more about wild trout and where to find them in their specific region, the Heritage and Wild Trout Program has resources explaining wild trout management and maps of **Designated Wild and Heritage Trout Waters** helping you find these special fish. For anglers that feel up to a challenge, CDFW offers the Heritage Trout Challenge, which requires anglers to catch six different forms of California native trout from their historic drainages!



From Sierra Drifters

Fred Rowe, Sierra Bright Dot Guide Service, Fly Fishing Report, April 29, 2022:

At mid-day I drove from Riverside to Bishop on Thursday. I was surprised at the lack of motorhomes, trailers, campers, and boats on the highway. When I got into Bishop there were just a few boats and trailers to be seen. Friday before opener is the day that most anglers make the pilgrimage to the Eastern Sierra for the trout open or more affectionately known as fishmas. When I was growing up in the 70's in southern California and lived in Mammoth Lakes in the 80's opening weekend was a much bigger deal. I can remember waiting at least an hour to get in the gate at Crowley Lake. There were huge crowds of anglers at spots like Crowley Lake, Convict Lake and the June Lake Loop.

For me opener is anticlimactic these days as I've been fishing all the fly fishing waters year round. I've even fished a few of the creeks that are not well known fly fishing waters, but are now open to winter catch and release fishing with lures and flies. For a while now, I spend opening weekend on Bishop Park Pond. Along with other volunteer guides I will be teaching 6 to 12 year old's how to fly fish. This event is called Fish Camp. As part of fish camp the campers are allowed to catch and release fly fish in Bishop Park Pond.

Lower Owens River, Wild Trout Section:

Flows have gone up slightly to 175 CFS and I think they will continue to slowly rise as City of Los Angeles Department of Water and Power is increasing flows to full fill irrigation commitments in the Owens Valley. It usually takes a few days of steady flows for the fish to acclimate to the increased flows. There has not been much surface activity from the wild brown trout. There are a few size 20 blue wing olive mayflies and some size 16 pale morning duns hatching. Nymphing has been the most productive method of fly fishing the lower river. I've been using size 18 bead head flash back pheasant tail nymphs and size 16 and 18 bead head flash back gold ribbed hare's ears. A mop fly is a pattern that works well or produces nothing. I had my first couple days of seeing a client catch fish on a tan mop fly last week.

Feature Article, cont.

Hot Creek, Interpretive Site:

Nice warm days with no wind has allowed fly fishers to enjoy the dry fly fishing in the Interpretive site. Winds, particularly in the afternoons, are hampering fly fisher efforts of catching trout. Midge nymphs in the morning are producing fish previous to the blue wing olive hatch. During the hatch blue wing olive parachutes and olive sparkle duns in size 20 are fooling the rainbows and browns that inhabit this section.

Hot Creek, Canyon Section:

Nymphing in the canyon is the most productive way to fly fish in Hot Creek. The fish are holding around the structure like rocks, and weed beds. A nymph underneath a dry fly placed so it floats into these trout holding structures will produce trout. I like to fish my nymph patterns two to three feet underneath a size 16 Adams parachute. I tie size 16, or 18, olive quilldigs or size 18 or 20 bead head flash back pheasant tail nymphs onto 5X fluorocarbon. Best fishing is from 9:00 A. M. to 2:00 P.M.

Upper Owens River, Above Benton Crossing Bridge:

It's in between time on the upper Owens River. The trophy rainbow run out of Crowley Lake is done for the year. The cutthroat run has not started yet. I will start looking for this run after the 5th of May. The cutthroat run only lasts a few weeks and is usually done by Memorial weekend. With no trophy trout in the Owens River to catch fly fishers are hooking a few Juvenile rainbows and browns. There is not enough insect activity to get these fish into a consistent feeding situation. Tiger midges, zebra midges, pheasant tail nymphs, and gold ribbed hare's ears are fooling a few fish when fished under an indicator.

Bishop Creek Canal, Behind the Ford Dealer:

In preparation for the general trout season opener on Saturday April 30, 2022 the California Department of Fish and Wildlife stocked Bishop Creek Canal with rainbow trout. These fish have been providing lots of catch and release fly fishing opportunities for fly fishers. With the general opener allowing these fish to be kept their numbers will dwindle quickly. There are still lots of wild brown trout willing to take a size 18 bead head flash back pheasant tail nymph or size 16 bead head flash back gold ribbed hare's ear nymph. I'm fishing the nymphs under an indicator for beginners and on a Euro nymph rig for myself (link for [Fred Rowe](#), Sierra Bright Dot Guide Service). **NOTE, San Diego Fly Fishers does not endorse nor recommend any particular Guide or Business, but we do list guides members have used in the past on our Guides and Resources page.**

CDFW: In 2021, CDFW issued updated regulations for Mono County. The 18 "resort lakes," including Crowley, Rock Creek (Lake), Convict, Lundy, Virginia Lakes, Bridgeport Reservoir, Twin Lakes (Bridgeport), the lakes of the June Lake Loop, and Mammoth Lakes Basin, retained the traditional "Fishmas" opening and closing dates (the last Saturday in April through November 15). However, **all rivers and streams in Mono County now have special regulations** pertaining to season start and end dates, hook and lure restrictions, fish size limits, and possession limits. From Sierrawave: Eastern Sierra locals and visitors alike are gearing up for "Fishmas" on Saturday, April 30th, the official start to Mono County's regular fishing season. All front country lakes, rivers, and stream will be thawed by Fishmas, providing some prime conditions for anglers to celebrate the opening of the season. Many roads and mountain passes are also starting to reopen from their seasonal road closures. Monitor Pass (State Route 89) reopened on April 1, SR 120 E/Mono Mills Road reopened on March 22, and the June Lake Loop (Highway 158) reopened on March 21. Sonora Pass (SR 108) and Tioga Pass (SR 120 W) are still closed at this time, but work is underway to clear snow and debris. "The Eastern Sierra is home to some of the best fishing in the country, and we're excited to welcome anglers to Mono County for Fishmas and the 2022 fishing season," said Bob Gardner, Chair of the Mono County Board of Supervisors. Mono County, along with Mammoth Lakes Tourism and private marina operators, will be stocking over \$250,000 of trout throughout the county this spring and summer. Mono County, specifically, stocks 18 bodies of water in the region with almost 18,000 pounds of rainbow trout starting the second week of April. Anglers are encouraged to join the effort to keep Eastern Sierra fisheries healthy and sustainable by practicing "catch and release" – keeping only the fish they need and releasing the rest to reproduce and grow. Fly of the Month

HOOK: 4X-long streamer hook, size 8
HEAD: Nickel cone, large
WEIGHT: Lead-free round wire, 020
ADHESIVE#1: Superglue or head cement of your choice
THREAD: Brown olive, 6/0 or 140-denier
RIB: Chartreuse Ultra Wire, brassie size
BODY: Silver Sparkle Braid
ADHESIVE#2: Superglue or head cement of your choice
WING/TAIL: Chartreuse pine-squirrel Zonker strip
COLLAR: Chartreuse pine-squirrel Zonker strip

The Slumpbuster



A large size nickel cone head looks about right for this hook. Insert the point of the hook into the cone, small hole first, and thread it around to behind the hook eye. With the cone in place, get the hook firmly secured in your tying vise.

This fly works well with a lot of weight so I'm going to add some .02 lead free wire. Plunger-style hackle pliers allow you to get the weight started on the hook shank so there's no waste. To really get the fly down, I'm going to use a full 20 wraps.

To stabilize things, apply a liberal drop or two of your favorite adhesive to the hook shank and wraps, before sliding the wraps forward to pin the cone against the hook eye.

Once you get all the wraps neatly in order, load a bobbin with a nice heavy tying thread, here I'm using UTC 140 Denier in a brown olive. Start your thread on the hook shank immediately behind the wire and take wraps rearward before snipping or breaking off the tag. Take wraps forward over the weight to further secure it and then build a little thread ramp down to the hook shank.

For the fly's rib, I'm going to use brassie-sized, chartreuse, ultra wire, but the color is entirely up to you. A 10" piece is enough for numerous flies. Secure the wire to the near side of the hook shank and take thread wraps, binding it down all the way to the bend. Then wrap your thread forward to just behind the weight.

Snip a 4-5 inch length of silver sparkle braid free from the card. Secure one end of it at the tie-in point and take wraps rearward to the bend, and then forward all the way back up to the edge of the cone. Although not essential, a little adhesive applied to saturate the thread wraps can't hurt, in terms of durability.

Get hold of the silver braid and start taking slightly overlapping wraps forward up the hook shank, ending at the back edge of the cone. Secure the braid with several tight turns of tying thread and then snip the excess off close.

The final ingredient for this fly is a pine squirrel zonker strip. Here I'm using chartreuse, but they come in a wide range of colors. Get hold of the butt end of the strip and remove a small amount of fur to expose the bare hide. Push the hide up into the cone, on top of the hook shank, and take thread wraps to secure it. Really bind it down well, as you don't want the strip pulling free. Tug on the strip to stretch it rearward and then wet your fingers to make the fur more manageable. Preen the fur upward so it's at a 90 degree angle to the hide. Part the fur right above the ribbing wire and start making wraps between clumps of fur to secure the strip all the way up the shank. If you can make the wraps fairly even, and not bind down too much fur in the process, so much the better. When you reach your tying thread, take wraps to secure the wire really well. You can helicopter to break the wire off if you'd like but here I'm just going to use fine point wire cutters.

Everybody seems to have their own preference for tail length on these things. I prefer fairly short and will snip the hide off so it's a little more than a half a hook shank in length. Once the fur is pulled back, the tail looks a good bit longer.

Get hold of the remaining pine squirrel strip and, again, remove a small amount of fur. Secure it to the hook shank just as you did the previous strip then start making wraps so the hide is wrapped around the hook and the fur is swept back. I like to really pack the wraps in behind the cone so there's no space left between the two. You can then secure the strip with a few tight turns of tying thread. Carefully snip the excess strip off close and take a few more thread wraps to make sure everything's seated below the edge of the cone. Do a 5 or 6 turn whip finish and snip or cut your tying thread free.

Conservation & Education



Golden Trout Trip June 24-27, 2021



Once again this year we are planning our volunteer conservation and fishing trip into the Golden Trout Wilderness June 24-27. This is our biggest conservation effort each year. We take a dozen or two hardy volunteers on a 2 mile hike into Casa Vieja Meadow where we work as USFS volunteers erecting a barbed wire and electric fence designed to keep grazing cattle away from Nine Mile Creek that runs through the meadow. We always plan time for fishing and almost everyone catches fish. My 10-year-old grandson caught 15 golden trout on his first trip with a fly rod so this is a good place for beginners. Most of these beautiful trout are small but each trip we catch a few up to 14 inches.

We camp at the Blackrock Trailhead above Kennedy Meadows in Sequoia National Forest. It a narrow but paved road all the way and many of us sleep in our vehicles or small RVs, but there are prepared tent sites. We set up a group kitchen and share meal preparation duties. The site is above 9,000 ft so it can be cold or rainy and some folks have trouble sleeping at that altitude if they have breathing issues. The trail into the meadow is well prepared but steep. We only carry small day packs so most folks find the daily hike up out of the meadow strenuous but doable. We allow plenty of time for hiking at your own pace. This is a family friendly event, but only recommended for children 10 or older with some hiking experience.

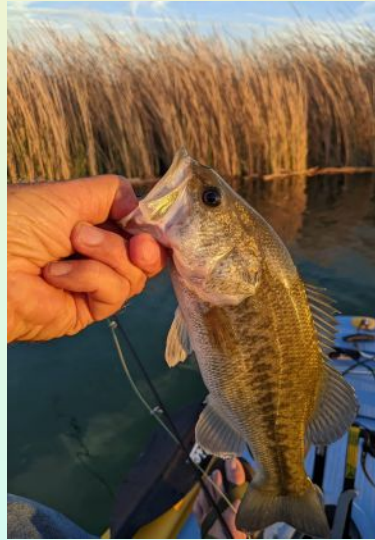

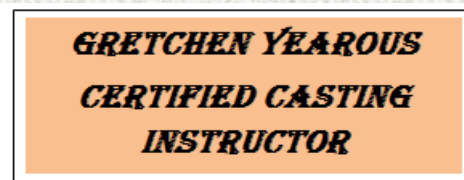
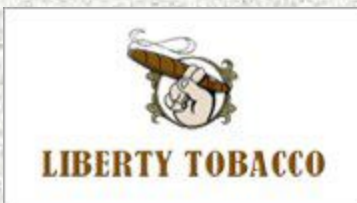
